The Ninth and Tenth commandments are about contentment.

The Ninth Commandment:

You shall not covet your neighbor's house.

The Tenth Commandment:

You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or his manservant or maidservant, his ox or donkey, or anything else that belongs to your neighbor.

Luther's Small Catechism (2017 edition from Concordia Publishing House) says the central thought of these commandments is that "God created us to be content with the gifts by which He sustains our life."

There's that word: "content."

Consider this: To be miserable, I want what I don't need.

And consider this: To be content, I want what I need, and I don't want what I don't need.

Read those sentences again, about being miserable and being content.

OK, let's go on...

Being a content and thankful Christian also means we know we have a loving heavenly Father who provides for us. (Read the explanation to the First Article of the Apostles' Creed for a beautiful statement of God's care for our physical life, "out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit of worthiness in me.") This is undeserved providence from our Father in heaven!

And then there's the Father's grace in Jesus Christ; His giving of Jesus into this world, Jesus' giving of His life for our sins (resulting in our forgiveness), the gift of faith and everlasting life.

That's grace! Not getting what I do deserve (hell!) and getting what I don't deserve (heaven!), all because of Jesus.

Let's review: I am miserable when I want what I don't need. But I am content and thankful when I want what I need, and I don't want what I don't need, and


'In good times and bad'

In February, historic wildfires ravaged two communities in Chile, destroying 12,000 homes and killing more than 100 people. As Chilean Lutherans cared for victims, one pastor noted, "On my own, I don't have anything good to say to anybody. ... [But] I realized ... I could say to [the victims], 'Through the Word of God, you are not alone.'"

The Fall 2024 issue of *Lutherans Engage* the World explores how Lutherans are sharing the Gospel in both good times and bad. In addition to a feature story on the disasters in Chile and Brazil, the issue gives a glimpse into the work of the Rev. Dr. Daniel Jastram, the Synod's only missionary in Japan, who is bringing together faithful Lutherans scattered around the country.

The issue also includes an article about two Lutheran foster families that are caring for children in need and a firsthand account of what it's like to serve on a short-term team through LCMS International Mission.

"This issue ... delivers inspiring stories of those who love and believe in these Scriptures," writes Rev. Kevin Robson, LCMS chief mission officer. "In turn, they

it began and we will be back to our normal routines. It seems there is hardly any time to be thankful at all on that day.

But the Christian does not need any day in particular to be thankful. Rather, we are to be thankful every day. Paul's words apply to us, not just on Thanksgiving Day, but every day. "Put on love." "Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts." "Be thankful." "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly." It would be absurd of us to put on love for just one day a year, to let the Word of Christ dwell in us for just one day a year. It is just as absurd for us to think we have one day a year set aside to be thankful.

Yet the command to "be thankful" cannot produce thankfulness, just as telling a sad person to be happy will not simply make that person happy. Our thankfulness is a response to the grace of God to us. On Thanksgiving, but also before every meal, we are to receive our food with thanksgiving. Why? Because our God satisfies our every need. As the psalmist says:

The eyes of all look to you, and you give them their food in due season. You open your hand; you satisfy the desire of every living thing.

If He indeed satisfies the desire of every living thing, how is Christian thanksgiving different? It's not measured by the frequency, nor the intensity or the bounty of our Thanksgiving meals. Our Thanksgiving is different because we know the God of heaven and earth by grace in His Son, our Lord Jesus, who laid down His life to free us from all sin. death and the power of the devil. He has called us His own children through the waters of Holy Baptism. He feeds us with His body and blood, that we may have life and have it to the full. And because He rose, still bearing those nailscarred hands, we know that "nothing will separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus" (ROMANS 8:38-39). Therefore. we are thankful at all times because we have received grace upon grace and He still provides for all our daily needs.

So whether you have much or whether you have little, whether this is for you a year of surplus or a year of deficit, as you take time to remember this past year and all the blessings that the Lord your God has given you, be thankful.

For Jesus lives. You have been bought and paid for. Not with gold or silver. But with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death, that you may be His own. You are His. He is yours. Forever.

But what if you're just starting to learn and pray the Psalms?


With your Bible and one of these pages in hand, you should have everything you need to take your first step into any of the 150 Psalms.

ive members of St. Paul, Spearfish, attended the LCMS 2024 Institute on Liturgy, Preaching and Church Music, held July 9-12 at Concordia University, Nebraska.

The theme was "Songs of Deliverance: Psalms in the Great Congregation." We slept in dorms, ate meals in the cafeteria and attended sessions at various campus buildings. Over 500 pastors, musicians and laity attended.

Worship services and keynote addresses were held at St. John's Lutheran Church, across the street from the campus in Seward. Worship services were held each morning and evening with vocal choirs, handbell choirs and organists providing special music. Many voices filled the sanctuary with hymns. Pastors and keynote speakers offered inspired preaching and a wealth of information about the Psalms.

Learning sessions were offered in all aspects of liturgy, preaching and music. Accomplished musicians gave organ and piano recitals.

Every worship service, keynote speech and learning session began with a Psalm, either spoken or sung. All 150 Psalms were covered, including Psalm 119 and all its 176 verses!

Evening events included folk dancing, a "Beer and Bach" sing-along at the Bottle Rocket Brewing Company, and a live organist-accompanied silent movie at the historic Rivoli Theater. After the evening festivities came Compline, a brief worship service held in the dark around the campus fireplace or downtown Seward. There we sang and prayed to God under the stars.

The Institute has traditionally been a triennial event. What a blessing to the members of the LCMS. The friendliness of everyone, the Lutheran hymns, the Psalms, and the glorious music make for unforgettable memories.
