Why Do We Bow, Kneel, and Act Reverently in Church?

I did some reading on how so many Christians of the past were under terrible persecution for their faith. Many were imprisoned and some were put to death if they did not give up their Christian faith and accept the religion of the government or the corrupt church at the time. Martin Luther faced death at the hands of the church in his day. He had to go into hiding for several months at the Wartburg Castle. Lutherans in the 19th century had to leave Europe to come to America where they had freedom to worship God according to God's Word. Many died on that dangerous journey across the Atlantic Ocean. Freedom of religion has been very rare throughout the history of the church.

Today we as Lutherans living in America should be so thankful that no one from the government or other churches is demanding that we give up our faith or be imprisoned or put to death as most Christians of the past. We have freedom to have a church, and to attend church services where we can worship and praise God and grow in our faith and knowledge of the true God as revealed in the Bible. We are so blessed with this wonderful freedom of religion. We should be thanking God for how good He has been to us to give us so many blessings, that Christians of the past could only dream of. How terrible it is to see so many people today just throw away all these opportunities to worship God in church and to grow in the grace and knowledge of Jesus. Think of our hymnal with different worship services and hymns that praise God and explain the Word of God so well. We should set aside all worldly distractions and make hearing the Word the most important thing in life. And what a privilege it is for me as your vacancy pastor to be able to share God's Word with you in your church!

And think of the Reformers of Luther's day who brought out so many truths from the Word of God which helps us to understand who Jesus is, and what He has done for us.

Martin Luther wrote two wonderful prayers for Christians of all times. The first is the morning prayer of which he says, "In the morning when you get up, make the sign of the holy cross and say: In the name of the Father and of the kneeling or standing, repeat the Creed and the Lord's Prayer. If you choose, you may also say this little prayer: I thank You, my heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ, Your dear Son, that You have kept me this night from all harm and danger; and I pray that You would keep me this day also from sin and every evil, that all my doings and life may please You. For into Your hands I commend myself, my body and soul, and all things. Let Your holy angel be with me, that the evil foe may have no power over me. Amen." Then go joyfully to your work, singing a hymn, like that of the Ten Commandments, or whatever your devotion may suggest.

While we never know what a new day will bring, we know that God is always with us and will take care of us. (Proverbs 3:5-6)

PASTOR, WHO ARE YOU VOTING FOR?

One of my junior catechumens asked that last week. Politics, and political advertising, are wall-to-wall and around-the-clock here in lowa these days. By "these days," I mean most of the 10 years since I was called to lowa. ... The answer to that question is never short. Instead, I point our members to two basic Scriptures about the relationship of the Christian to government and politics.

First, Romans 13:1: Let every person be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God.

Next, to Acts 5:29, where Peter and the other apostles say: We must obey God rather than men." ...

We also have great liberty to speak to elected officials and to hold them accountable for what is allowed on their watch. Those who bear the name of Christ must pray for these officials, encourage them in their vocation, and lovingly communicate the beautiful worldview the Lord holds out in Scripture (and not necessarily with a direct reference to the Bible).

With the murder of the unborn and the perversion of marriage heralded as normal and preferable, now is no time for the church in America to be silent. We dare not sit this one out.

Though we despair of the available candidates, grieve decisions of the courts and mourn the fruits of elections, we still act, remembering that God says: "the Most High rules the kingdom of men and gives it to whom he will and sets over it the lowliest of men" (Daniel 4:17).

And the Ministers Who Have Served Our Congregations

In the late 1800s, most of the settlers who came to South Dakota were of European descent. Many of the pioneers were of German ancestry. They brought the teachings of Martin Luther with them in their Bibles and their hearts.

In 1883, a number of German Lutheran settlers in the White Lake-Plankinton area began the work of organizing a congregation. A pioneer from Gales Township, Fred Uecher, wrote to missionary Andrew Mueller at Marion Junction asking him if it would be possible to have services for the German speaking Lutherans in this area. Pastor Mueller replied immediately. He explored the area as thoroughly as possible and appealed to the Synodical Mission Board for aid. The mission Board complied with his request and almost immediately sent to this territory a young student by the name of Philip Laux. Under the guidance and supervision of Pastor Mueller, Mr. Laux worked hard and faithfully for one year.

In 1884 the Mission Board called the ministerial candidate A. H. Kuntz, as a resident pastor to the Plankinton-White Lake area. A rented home was found for him in the village of White Lake. Shortly after his arrival, St. Martin's Lutheran Church in White Lake was organized.

In the Plankinton area services were held in homes and in rural schoolhouses. Occasionally the Lutherans of Plankinton attended services in St. Martin's Lutheran Church in White Lake. In the early years, services were held in the County Court House in Plankinton. Halls and local churches were also rented at times to afford a suitable place for worship.

In 1888 St. John's Lutheran Church was started in Crystal Lake Township.

Around 1890 Pastor Heinrich Hanneman was called. Pastors Frank Albrecht and Fred Gade followed in 1899 and 1903. It was during Pastor Gade's ministry, in 1910, that the Plankinton congregation, St. Paul's Lutheran Church, was organized. A new building was begun in 1913.

In 1913 Rev. August Oberheu was called to serve the Plankinton-White Lake parish. He served until 1922.

St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church, Gales Township, was organized in 1914.

Rev. Arthur C. Streufert served from 1922 to 1928. Rev. Belno R. Lange served both congregations from 1929 to 1932. In 1932, a pastor was called to serve the White Lake congregations only. Rev. T. H. Buehner served White Lake from 1932 to 1941. Rev. Lange continued serving Plankinton through 1942.

Rev. Steve Persa served from 1942 to 1954. At this time, it was decided to once again form a dual parish of Plankinton and White Lake.

In 1952, membership of St. John's at Crystal Lake was dissolved. Some of the members joined what became Trinity Lutheran at White Lake while those living in the southern part of the area joined St. Paul's at Stickney. The bell in front of Trinity is from St. John's, Crystal Lake.

Rev. Robert Kamprath served from 1954 to 1957. During his pastorage it was seen to be feasible to merge St. John's in Gales Township and St. Martin's Lutheran churches into one congregation, Trinity Lutheran Church. A new building was constructed. It's doors opened June 12, 1955.

Rev. G. O. Bohn served from 1957 to 1963. During this time, St. Paul's began construction on a new church building. A groundbreaking ceremony was held August 12, 1962.
